## ③ Lack of attitudinal strength

due to affective abilities (emotion) dominates

cognitive abilities (fact)

e.g. Buying a costly car even milage is less.

for ex using poor man for clinical trial is without proper knowledge is treated as unethical.

Importance

① Doctors: due to nexus with pharma companies & diagnostics many doctors are not prescribing generic medicines and prescribing unnecessary lab tests which is an ethical issue.

② pharma Companies: due to profit motive, not producing generics, clinical trials on illiterate without proper compensation etc are rising in recent past

③ Government: poor regulation of CDSCO

regarding clinical trials, Corruption practices by Medical Council of India, Removing some medicines from list of essential medicines last year. are all ethical issues.

In recent past the issue of J&J's hip transplant surgery raised alarms all over the world.

Many faulty transplants were supplied. And in India alone around 5000 people are suffering from these equipment.

This is an ethical issue because unless until court order J&J didn't compensated the patients and there are still left behind due to lack of awareness.

Hence from awarding permissions to prescribing medicines the principles of right/wrong should be adhered to.

Right are entitlements to get and Duties are obligations to do, due to the part of a society.




- b) What are the challenges associated with the institutional and societal framework for fighting corruption? (10 Marks) (150 Words)

8. You are the Superintendent of Police of a populous district in central India. Deaths due to road accidents in your district are at a historical high. Most fatalities in road accidents occur due to delay in first aid and treatment. New guidelines that no bystander rushing to the rescue of an accident victim should be subject to civil or criminal liability and/or be forced to be a witness have been issued. These are intended to encourage people to help accident victims without fear of being harassed by the police.

These guidelines do not seem to be having their desired effect. It is being observed that people are still unwilling to come to the rescue of road accident victims. Upon investigation, it is found that part of the problem is the perception of the police in the general opinion. People seem to want to avoid interacting with the police as far as possible. *WC*

You wish to improve the image of the police to improve the law and order situation in your district in general and to encourage Good Samaritans in particular.

- b) What are the various tools at your disposal?
- c) What are the challenges you anticipate and how will you overcome them?

## ① Priorities of Response.

My first priority to address the ethical issues of

- ① poor work culture in police department
- ② lack of citizen participation
- ③ Apathy of police against common people and fear of people against police.

→ The work culture in the police department here senses is not people friendly. Still people perceives going to police station as a ~~crime~~. That's why a well intended law of good samaritan was lying in the books as it is. My first priority to change the work culture of police department

→ My second priority to involve the citizen participation in policing activities in some

small traffic drives etc as a first step.

→ Third priority to this particular good Samaritan issue where steps should be taken to help the victims of road accident.

### Various tools

Telangana government came with the policy of friendly policing.

I will take the cue from this initiative to improve the work culture of police where people are sensitized about police activities through media activities.

② They were encouraged to visit police stations on specified dates to know the functioning of various tools.

On police's behaviour, the tools available are ethical training to the staff, punishments towards wrong doers etc.

But always the means are compromised.

Using an unethical way to expose another unethical matter is unethical.

Hence sting operations with objective backup can be taken.



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10. In the wake of increased attacks on security forces posted in Naxal affected areas, an urgent meeting was held by the Ministry of Home Affairs. While everyone agreed to the increased threat of the Left Wing Extremists, consensus could not be reached on the approach needed to handle this aggravating problem.

Some members advocated that a political understanding must be reached with Naxalites and offered socio-economic solutions. Some others emphasized that the tribals have been historically wronged and the Naxals are raising a valid issue although their methods are unconstitutional. Others were of the view that Naxals are the biggest terrorists and thus the option of using army and laws like AFSPA should be explored.





A few months ago, a small tribal community was rehabilitated to a vacant plot near your village after their traditional lands were acquired. Children from this community have joined your school.

However, the transition has been far from smooth. Sectarian consciousness among the students is visibly higher and they tend to socialize within identity based compartments. The cause for this lies in the competing claims of the two communities over an orchard near the new settlement, which was earlier under the informal ownership of the village community. You are concerned that tensions among the communities are harming student relations and the school's performance.

What steps would you take to arrest the trend and ensure holistic development among your students? Suggest a strategy for your school and students to foster healthy social relations to ensure continuing peace and prosperity.

- ③ Sensitizing them with the great life's of our freedom fighters and how they fought together transcending all their religion, caste, region differences for independence of this country
- ④ Conducting essay & elocution competitions on topics like Tolerance, unity, peace etc and enabling them to discuss

on these issues.

### Strategy for healthy social relations

- ① Utilizing Gramabha as a source to discuss with all communities about issues of community quarrels and their impact on the students
- ② Conducting muktaad natak with school students in Community Hall about the importance of harmony in the society.
- ③ Requesting government to revise the curriculum of education to include moral education along with social relations as a separate subject

④ Meeting with NGOs and district public relation officials to sensitize the different communities about importance of the peace and ultimate prosperity.
